Course Summary

Are you interested in understanding human behavior, social systems, and the complexities of society? The **Access to HE: Social Sciences** course offers a comprehensive introduction to the fields of psychology and sociology, equipping you with the knowledge and skills needed to pursue a career or further study in social sciences.

This course is designed for people aged 19 or over and is perfect for anyone looking to start or change to a career in the mental health, therapy, educational, neuroscience, sociology or psychology fields or considering changing careers to work in these fields. It is also suitable for applicants who are interested in pursuing academic careers such as in humanity-based subjects.

The course explores the major theories, perspectives, and methodologies used to understand both individuals and society. Whether you're fascinated by the workings of the human mind or the dynamics of social structures, this course will provide you with a strong foundation in both disciplines, preparing you for higher education or careers in

areas such as social work, counseling, criminology, or education. You will study topics such as Crime, Memory, Psychology and Sociology, and Treating Disorders.

What You Will Learn

- Develop an understanding of key psychological concepts such as behavior, cognition, emotion, psychological disorders, and memory processes, and how they shape individual and group behavior
- Analyze the major psychological perspectives (cognitive, behavioral, psychodynamic, etc.) and their application to human behavior in various contexts.
- Explore culture, identity, family dynamics, poverty, social relations, and crime, and understand how these shape individuals and societies.
- Critically evaluate sociological theories and apply them to contemporary social issues such as inequality, education, and crime.
- Research and Investigation Skills:
- Apply psychological theories to understand human behavior in real-life situations, including the treatment of mental health disorders and offender profiling.
- Analyze social problems from multiple perspectives, using sociological theories and research findings to understand and address contemporary societal challenges.
- Develop effective interpersonal communication skills, both written and verbal, for presenting ideas, arguments, and research findings clearly and confidently.
- Use ICT tools, including presentation software, to effectively communicate research results and academic work in a professional format

Induction for this course will begin at the start of September.

Progression

We will introduce you to the UCAS system and provide tutorial sessions for university applications.
