- An Access to Higher Education Diploma awarded by an approved further education institution
- Related work experience
- An international equivalent of the above

Additional Criteria

Non-standard applicants will be required to produce evidence of their ability to study at the Higher Education level. Short-course and relevant work experience may be taken into account. Non-standard applicants will be interviewed with a portfolio of work and may be required to complete a piece of written work as part of their application. Claims for Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) are welcomed by the College. Students should consult the admissions tutor if they wish to claim such recognition.

Additional admissions matters

Applicants will be invited to an interview and present a portfolio of practical work. This portfolio may consist of research, design development and work in progress (such as sketchbooks, visual journal) or finished pieces of work.

The nature of this course will actively encourage learners from non-traditional learning routes.

International students are additionally required to achieve an overall score of 5.5 (with each subset no lower than 5.5) in IELTS. Please consult the admissions department for further details.

Learning and teaching strategies

The programme is delivered via blended learning, including short, intensive blocks of delivery at college, followed by email, telephone, Skype or face-to-face tutorials. Moodle is also integral to providing support to learners.

During teaching blocks at college, teaching takes the form of group critiques with peers, seminars, group presentations, lectures, workshop inductions, practical demonstrations and hands-on practical activity. The curriculum is enriched by external study visits, trips and visiting speakers. The on-site Bradford College Textile Archive is widely used for teaching and independent student research. Students also have access to industry-led talks and activities via our industry links with the Bradford Textile Society, Cloth Workers Guild, and local art networks.

Assessment strategy

Assessment tasks are linked to the learning outcomes for each module and are completed by the end of the module. Assessments generally take the form of course work in the form of specific project briefs appropriate to each module, which may include some of the following:

- Research files
- Sketchbooks, drawing and visual journals
- Illustrated reports
- Textile sampling
- Finished products
- Verbal and visual presentations
- Exhibitions or portfolios

Formative assessment takes place throughout the course, during feedback at one-to-one tutorials and through peer review at group critiques. This feedback is aimed to support the learner's development and does not contribute to a final grade.

Written summative assessment will be provided by the module tutor after the module has been completed. Verbal feedback may also be offered during tutorials to provide clarification.

Role of external examiners

There will be an introduction to the programme identifying expectations and any impact this has on the completion of work and assessment.

Students will receive regular tutorials throughout the year both during teaching weekends and by email/phone/skype to track their progress on the programme and discuss any issues regarding their studies. There are systems in place to account for any difficulties that students might encounter on the programme, including the option to apply for mitigating circumstances and extensions to deadlines.
